Mario Cimoli is the Director of the Division of Production, Productivity and Management at the UN Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC). He obtained his Ph.D. at the SPRU (University of Sussex) and since 1992 he is Professor of Economics at the University of Venice (Ca' Foscari). In 2004 he was awarded the Philip Morris Chair of International Business at the Sant'Anna School of Advanced Studies (University of Pisa). He has been appointed as co-director (with Giovanni Dosi and Joseph Stiglitz) of two task forces (Industrial Policy and Intellectual Property Rights Regimes for Development) of the Initiative for Policy Dialogue of the Columbia University (New York) and he is co-chairing (with Justin Yifu, Dani Rodrik and Joseph Stiglitz) the Scientific Committee for Industrial Policy of the International Economic Association (IEA).

He writes books and articles on innovation, technological change and development, as well as science, technology and industrial issues, focusing on Latin America. His most recent publications include: *Learning, Technological Capabilities and Structural Dynamics* (in Ocampo, JA y Ros, J., (eds.), Oxford University Press, 2011); *Innovation and Economic Development: the Impact of Information and Communication Technologies in Latin America* (Edward Elgar, 2010); *Industrial Policy and Development, The Political Economy of Capabilities Accumulation* (Oxford University Press, 2009) (with G. Dosi and JE. Stiglitz (eds.)); *Structural Change and the BOT constraint: why did Latin America fail to converge?* (Cambridge Journal of Economics, 2010), and *Global Growth and Implicit Reciprocity: A Structuralist Perspective* (Cambridge Journal of Economics, 2010).
